

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100 YEAR CELEBRATION

n 2023, Orange County Library System marked a century of community service. The Albertson Public Library first opened its doors on November 8, 1923, and it has evolved into the library system you use today. Throughout the year, we hosted special events and programs reflecting on our rich past.

Library Director/CEO Steve Powell made an exciting announcement at our 100 Year Celebration kickoff: thanks to a generous \$100,000 donation from the Sorosis of Orlando Woman's Club, mobile services, including a book bike and bookmobile, would return to the library system. Joined by local officials, library leadership held a ribbon-cutting ceremony, reaffirming the library's dedication to our community for the next 100 years.


Throughout the year, OCLS organized special author events that brought esteemed writers like Kwame



MOBILE HOTSPOTS

he hotspot checkout program launched in January to help foster digital equity in the community. OCLS received a grant of \$447,800 from the Emergency Connectivity Fund for the purchase of 1,000 new Wi-Fi hotspots.

This program helps to bridge the digital divide, providing essential broadband services for customers without home internet access. It's already had a remarkable impact on the community, especially for those using this service to meet their educational needs. From January to September 2023, customers checked out hotspots 4,453 times, illustrating their importance in the daily lives of our customers.



FINE FREE IN 2023

n October, we began a new chapter in our customer service story. The Board of Trustees voted to go fine free, welcoming thousands of people back to the library. If your books or movies are late, you can bring them back without a charge. All late fines were canceled, giving everyone the chance to use the library again with a clean slate.

OCLS is one of many public libraries that have eliminated fines. The goal is to break down service barriers and we're seeing positive results. Over 18,000 accounts that were blocked due to fines have started using the library again and those customers have checked out 223,203 items over the year since we went fine free.
